

2023 - 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

A Message from Library Director, Ike Pulver

Saratoga Springs has always been a community of readers. Few other communities our size support a bustling public library that is a community hub, a writers' and artists' colony, a large independent bookseller, a large retail chain bookstore, and two used and vintage book shops (including the Friends Book Shop inside the library, which has just completed its busiest year, ever), let alone a 20-year-old shared community reading project, SaratogaREADS! and a growing annual book festival.

Our reputation as readers has historically been reflected in circulation patterns. Unlike most other public libraries, when our collection began to include audio-visual materials, like movies, music, and audiobooks, movies never overtook books as the most-borrowed items. At the apex of DVD circulation, non-print materials peaked at about 50% of our circulation. Given the constantly-changing publishing landscape, and the ever-growing array of digital streaming and downloadable content, the trend of print circulation outpacing other formats became even more marked in 2023, when 65% of our circulation was print books. In fact, only 3 of the top 100 items borrowed in 2023 were DVDs, and book borrowing increased by 3% over 2022.

To be sure, while reading remains at the core of our mission, we are no strangers to innovation in our collections, programs, and services. Among the top 100 items circulated in 2023 were djembe drums, and passes to the Children's Museum at Saratoga, from our growing "Library of Things" that now includes cake pans, a metal detector, board games, gardening tools, and a car diagnostic device, among many other items.

Support from the Friends of the Saratoga Springs Public Library nurtures both our bookishness and our innovation. By a popular vote of the community, we celebrated the 20th anniversary of SaratogaREADS! by revisiting a past favorite, *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks* by Rebecca Skloot. Support from the Friends allowed us to be in conversation with members of Henrietta Lacks' family, about her ongoing legacy, and our country's continuing reckoning with issues around race, gender, and access to quality medical care. Since the Friends have taken stewardship of the Saratoga Book Festival, it has grown into a marquee event in the community, drawing writers and readers from far and wide to celebrate the written word. With support from the Friends, we have just wrapped up a Summer Reading Program during which our littlest readers logged nearly a half-million minutes of reading time, earning a Nintendo Switch for the Children's Room, and teens logged enough books read to earn 3D pens and a VR headset for the Teen Room.

As always, we remain grateful to the Friends staff, board, volunteers, and members for your ongoing support of our mission and operation.

2023-2024 President's Report

In reflecting on the past year - my last as president of the board - I am hard pressed to not compare the Friends of today with the organization I was initially charged with leading. The Saratoga Book Festival has matured at a near-unimaginable pace and continues to treat authors and readers, both local and visiting, of all ages and genres. And Friends Executive Director, Jen Allen, continues to balance the multi-faceted juggling act, while setting her sights on further growth and increasing the ways in which the Friends can support the Library and the community we serve.

It has truly been a team effort! So while it has been my honor to serve as steward of the Friends these past 38 months, the Friends' success, growth, and future potential would only have been possible because of you. Whether you are a Friends board member, staff, volunteer, member, donor, or customer; a Library trustee, employee, volunteer, or patron; or a member of the community we serve – thank you for the role you have all played in making the Friends the best it can be.

Executive Director's Report

- The Coffee Shop has shown steady growth and is now on the verge of breaking even. This achievement highlights our efforts in enhancing the shop's appeal and customer experience.

Membership Growth and Increased Support to the Library:

Finance Report

Jay Portnoy, Treasurer, FSSPL

Although we still operated with a deficit last year, we still ended the year in a better financial position than the year prior. In Fiscal year 2023–24 the Friends projected net income of \$2,750; but ended with a loss of \$31,689. However, this was better by \$21,690 compared to the 2022–23 loss of \$53,379. Revenues fell short by \$41,685, even though they improved by \$82,176. Most of this was due to overestimating the expected revenue of the newly opened Coffee Shop and less revenue than expected from grants and donations. Expenditures were actually \$7,246 under budget, even though they increased by \$60,486 over 2022–2023. We have planned for a net–zero budget for the 2024–2025 fiscal year.

Book Shop Report

Vinnie Asaro, Book Shop Committee Chair, FSSPL

The Book Shop continues to perform well and to break new records in 2024. This year marked an expansion in our online Amazon and Ebay sales. Inventory is stable as donations of books continue to be robust. CD's and DVD's have continued to be our best sellers. Foot traffic at the Book Shop continues to increase to pre-COVID numbers. Numerous sales have been successful and we have been able to increase our membership due to our monthly sales. Pop-up sales at the Saratoga Famer's Market continued this year and have increased our exposure in the community. Our volunteer corps continues to grow and many volunteers have been trained to help out with our online sales. A heartfelt thanks to our book shop manager, Jeff Budge and the dedicated team of volunteers he has trained to continue to promote our mission.

Jeff Budge, Book Shop Manager, FSSPL

Total revenues from the shop set an all-time record for the 2nd year in a row, over \$125,000 - up over 8% from last year. The shop also posted strong post-recovery Covid numbers, reaching 93% of pre-Covid numbers. Amazon sales remained steady- providing 33% of total shop revenues and EBAY sales dramatically increased 20% year over year - providing over 9% of total shop revenues. Our volunteer corps has expanded to over 65 volunteers and our support to the Community through two Outreach Programs and large paperback sales have been successful.

Coffee Shop Report

The Friends Coffee Shop has had a good start to its first year. Revenue continues to grow slowly and steadily. At present there are 8 volunteers dedicated to the coffee shop. The hours of operation are typically 10:00 am to 3:00 pm. Foot traffic is steadily increasing at the Coffee Shop. As the year progressed, we were able to offer food items for sale such as baked goods, soup and salads and iced coffee. Promotional gift bag sales were also offered during the holidays and summer. Space is a little tight in the coffee shop and we have worked to use the space more efficiently. Many thanks to Jen and Kristin and the dedicated volunteers who have made all of this possible, despite some challenges along the way. We look forward to another year with increased sales revenue and the pleasure of providing library visitors and staff with coffee and snacks.

Kristin Salisbury, Coffee Shop Manager, FSSPL

During its first year, the Coffee Shop grew revenue and customers each month. We started with a small menu and throughout the year have introduced iced coffee and daily soups, which have been well received by our patrons. Our dedicated team includes 5 regular volunteers and 3 seasonal volunteers. We continue to receive positive feedback, with many customers returning regularly, reflecting strong customer satisfaction and loyalty.

Public Relations, Memberships, & Development Report

Promotions on our social channels continue to help drive sales and awareness. In the latter part of the previous year, engaging with a book shop volunteer allowed us to diversify the types of posts we were putting on Facebook and Instagram, featuring items currently in stock in the shop. We hope to continue this trend. Our Facebook page has grown to 1.5k followers, which is an increase of more than 400 from the previous fiscal year. Our Instagram page continues to perform at an acceptable pace, still well behind Facebook but tends to pick up when we're posting substantive information (i.e. posts featuring items in the shop) on a regular basis. It has grown to 1,016 followers, an increase of 280 from last year.

The inclusion of the Saratoga Book Festival marketing on our channels continues to dramatically shift the reach of our posts. Ensuring we have SBF events listed on Facebook is helping drive the visibility of the event. The main event post has nearly 5K interested in the event with nearly 200 saying they are attending.

This past fiscal year we simplified our membership structure to 6 levels, ranging from \$15 to \$500. We have noticed a shift with more people purchasing higher level memberships than just the base. We remain steady with an average of 350 members, depending on the month.

We continue to raise funds through sponsorships and donations, both for the Saratoga Book Festival and in the general fund. Although we intended to run an annual campaign this past year, we were unable to get it off the ground. We anticipate being able to start an annual campaign this November.

We continue to work with community partners to highlight coming events in exchange for them doing the same. This increases our foothold in the community and allows the community to see our name in conjunction with appropriate events and not just the book shop.

Saratoga Book Festival Report

Ellen Beal, Vice President and Saratoga Book Festival Chair, FSSPL

The third annual Saratoga Book Festival was held October Oct 10-13 and featured more than 50 featured authors and a Literary Marketplace that included 90 local writers. Attendance grew over the previous year, with approximately 1,500 people registered for at least one program. The 2023 festival introduced several innovations in its second year of operation:

- 1. Added a performance of Fahrenheit 451 by the nonprofit theater company "Literature to Life" for area school students and teachers. The performance was attended by more than 200 students from five school districts in Upstate New York.
- 2. We increased the number of headliners. Popular authors included Wally Lamb, Roz Chast, Simon Winchester, Will McKibben, John Sayles, and Dani Shapiro.
- 3. We added sessions for writers on how to market their work, find an agent, and get started in publishing.
- 4. We held author events at the Literary Marketplace to increase floor traffic.

SBF 2024 Special Event held in April

On April 27, the Festival presented an "Evening with Donald Miller," author of the award-winning book *Masters the Air*. FSSPL was able to capitalize on the popularity of the Apple TV series *Masters of the Air* to market the event. Saratoga County Veterans Services provided a \$3,000 grant which allowed veterans to attend for free.

2022 Marie Madden Volunteer Award

The Marie Madden Volunteer Award is presented annually by the Friends of Saratoga Springs Public Library to recognize those who support reading, learning, and a literate society by offering their volunteer services to the public library. This award is given in memory of Marie Madden, a dedicated and tireless library volunteer whose good humor, high spirits, and hard work were an inspiration to library workers, library users, library trustees and all true FRIENDS of the Saratoga Springs Public Library and libraries everywhere.

For the last twelve years, **Garth & Diane Lloyd** have been actively in the Friends Community Outreach Program. In addition, they have gone above and beyond and supported the Library Outreach Program with Better World Books. They have handled about 15,000 books a year, and physically delivered many of them to not-for-profit destinations in the Saratoga area. Their consistent efforts to distribute, support and promote reading through our Outreach Programs epitomize the spirit of this award.

2022 H. Dunham Hunt Award

The H. Dunham Hunt Award is presented annually by the Friends of Saratoga Springs Public Library to recognize outstanding service to the community through support of the public library.

This award is given in memory of Dr. H. Dunham Hunt who throughout his life was a dedicated and tireless supporter of public library service, and who gave endlessly of his time and talent to create and nurture the Saratoga Springs Public Library from its inception in 1945 to his death in 1982

This year's honoree, for her stewardship of the Friends of the Saratoga Springs Public Library through a tumultuous period in the history of the organization, the Library, and, indeed the country and the world, is **Klare Ingram**.

Klare has devoted untold hours to reimagining, reorganizing, and revitalizing the Friends of the Saratoga Springs Public Library. Her efforts have resulted in the hiring of the Friends' first Executive Director, expansion of the operation of the Friends Book Shop into online sales and record profits, and the opening of the Friends Coffee Shop in the library's café space. She has worked tirelessly to modernize and energize the organization, and to maximize its impact on supporting the mission and staff of the library.

2023 Book Shop Volunteer of the Year

Don Proulx came on board last year to fill a major role for the Friends. He was assigned to help out with Amazon and Ebay on-line shipping, including shelving newly-listed items, packing up all sales, bringing them to the Post Office and recording tracking numbers. Don is one of those rare volunteers who comes in three times a week to help. In addition, he has found time to help out with inventory. As these duties were formally done by the Manager, this has allowed the manager to pay more attention to the shop and on-line sales programs. We are so grateful for the addition of Don to our volunteer family.
